

**Interfor Corporation is committed to sustainable forest management and sourcing logs from sustainably managed and non-controversial sources.**

- We operate in compliance with all applicable laws pertaining to forest management and log procurement.
- We maintain internationally recognized third-party sustainable forest management certification for all woodlands that we manage.
- We maintain internationally recognized third-party chain of custody and fiber-sourcing certification for all our lumber manufacturing operations.
- We are committed to sourcing logs and supplying wood products that originate from sustainably managed or non-controversial sources. We source logs originating from forest harvesting activities that:
  - comply with applicable local, national, or international legislation, applying to forest related activities, including the following areas:
    - forestry operations or harvesting, including biodiversity conservation and conversion of forest to other use;
    - management of areas with significant environmental or cultural values;
    - protected or endangered species, including requirements of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species (CITES);
    - health, labor and safety issues relating to forest workers, including meeting the spirit of the International Labour Organization (ILO) Declaration on Fundamental Principles and Rights at work;
    - Indigenous peoples' property, tenure, and use rights including meeting the spirit of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP);
    - third parties' property, tenure, and use rights; and
    - taxes, royalties and anti-corruption;
  - maintain the capability of forests to produce a range of wood and non-wood forest products and services on a sustainable basis or result in harvesting levels that can be sustained in the long term;
  - support global environmental priorities, including maintaining, conserving, or enhancing biodiversity on landscape, ecosystem, species, or genetic levels;
  - are followed by reforestation, not forest conversion, other than justified circumstances where the conversion:
    - is in compliance with national and regional policy and legislation applicable for land use and forest management;
    - does not have negative impacts on ecologically important forest areas, culturally and socially significant areas, or other protected areas;
    - does not destroy areas of significantly high carbon stock; and
    - makes a contribution to long-term conservation, economic, and/or social benefits;
  - are not associated with conflict timber; and
  - do not utilize genetically modified trees.
